Podcast and Episode Information

"Research in Action" is a weekly podcast about topics and issues related to research in higher education featuring experts across a range of disciplines.

On this episode, the guest is Dr. David Connor, a Professor Emeritus of Hunter College (Learning Disabilities Program) and the Graduate Center (Urban Education Program) of the City University of New York. He has taught in New York City for over thirty years, from high schoolers to doctoral students. Throughout his career, David has always been interested in issues of equality, particularly dis/ability and race. He is the author or editor of over a hundred articles and book chapters and nine books, most recent among them being DisCrit: Disability Studies and Critical Race Theory (2016) co-edited with Subini Annamma and Beth Ferri, Contemplating Dis/Ability in Schools and Society: A Life in Education (2018) and the second edition of Rethinking Disability: A Disability Studies Approach to Inclusive Practices (2019) coauthored with Jan Valle.

- Why did David Connor choose to write an autoethnography?
- Who does David Connor intend to be the audience for his work?
- What are David Connor's most effective strategies for completing a book?
- How does David Connor describe the relationship between Special Education as a field and Dis/Ability Studies?
- What strategies did David Connor provide for academics to get their ideas out there?

Possible Activities
